

About the author

Hilary Mantel was born in Glossop, UK in July 1952. She is the author of 15 books, including *A Place of Greater Safety*, *Beyond Black*, the memoir *Giving Up the Ghost* and the short-story collection *The Assassination of Margaret Thatcher*. Her two most recent novels, *Wolf Hall* and its sequel *Bring Up the Bodies*, have both been awarded the Man Booker Prize. She lives in Budleigh Salterton in the UK.

About the book

England, May 1536. Anne Boleyn is dead, decapitated in the space of a heartbeat by a hired French executioner. As her remains are bundled into oblivion, Thomas Cromwell breakfasts with the victors. The blacksmith's son from Putney emerges from the spring's bloodbath to continue his climb to power and wealth, while his formidable master, Henry VIII, settles to short-lived happiness with his third queen, Jane Seymour.

With *The Mirror & the Light*, Hilary Mantel brings to a triumphant close the trilogy she began with *Wolf Hall* and *Bring Up the Bodies*. She traces the final years of Thomas Cromwell, offering a defining portrait of predator and prey, of a ferocious contest between present and past, between royal will and a common man's vision: of a modern nation making itself through conflict, passion and courage.
